PRESENTATION OF COURSE

The aim of this curriculum is to discover, explore, and master the fundamental basics necessary for playing the oud.

The course offers an introduction to the instrument, its history, musical language, and the repertoires in which it is featured. This hands-on approach, designed for complete beginners, will gradually cover basic techniques, essential theoretical concepts (modes, rhythms, etc.), and a cultural understanding of the music performed.

Participants will explore repertoires from various traditions around the Mediterranean, including the Maghreb, as well as Arab traditions (Egyptian, Syrian, Iraqi) and Ottoman music.

This curriculum is intended for anyone wishing to begin learning the oud. It is open to children from age 7 and beginner adults. While previous musical experience is welcome, it is not required. No specific prerequisites are needed to register. Lessons may be offered in group or individual formats.

REGISTRATION CONDITIONS

- > Minimum age requirement: Open to children and adults from 11 years old onwards
- > The learning is intended for instrumentalists and singers who already have an initial experience with the Oud.
- > It is preferable to know how to read music.
- > At the end of the preliminary interview with IIMM, an entrance audition will be conducted by the teacher, including :
 - => A preliminary interview
 - => Presentation of a 5-minute piece of the student's choice

METHODS OF KNOWLEDGE ASSESSMENT

> CYCLE 1 • LEARNING THE FUNDAMENTALS

COURSE TAKEN AT IIMM / CONTINUOUS ASSESSMENT / 1 TO 2 YEARS OF STUDY

- → The student's work during the school year is assessed based on class participation (attendance) and personal progress evaluated by the subject teacher.
- → Semester evaluation: continuous assessment in the form of a comment and a grade.
- ightarrow The continuous assessment grade will count for 25% of the final exam at the end of the cycle.
- > Advancement between levels and the Level 1 final exam require a score of 12/20, conducted in the presence of an internal and external jury at IIMM.

MUSIC TRAINING AT AN ACCREDITED CONSERVATORY / 3 YEARS OF STUDY THE FIRST CYCLE CONSISTS OF 3 LEVELS:

- > Cycle 1, Level 1 (Beginner) // 1 year
- > Cycle 1, Level 2 (Intermediate) // 1 year
- > Cycle 1, Level 3 (Advanced) // 1 year

The exams take place in two stages:

- → Written test: listening commentary, auditory analysis, melodic and rhythmic transcription
- → Oral exam: sight-reading (treble and bass clefs), rhythm reading, binary and ternary rhythm reading, vocal sight-reading, instrumental sight-reading.
- > Advancement to the next level is granted with a score of 12/20 in the presence of an internal jury composed of teachers from the department.
- > The end-of-cycle 1 exam is passed with a score of 12/20, evaluated by external juries outside the conservatory.

> CYCLE 2 • MASTERY OF SKILLS

DISCIPLINE FOLLOWED AT THE IIMM / FINAL EXAM EACH YEAR UP TO THE B.E.M. / 1 TO 2 YEARS OF STUDY

- → Oral exam:
- Vocal and instrumental practice (individual and/or group)
 - Theory (questions on the elements studied during the year)
 - Historical knowledge

> Advancement to the next levels and obtaining the B.E.M. at the end of cycle 2 require a score of 12/20 in the presence of both internal and external juries at the IIMM

CLASSICAL MUSIC TRAINING OR VOCAL MUSIC TRAINING FOR SINGERS AT AN ACCREDITED CONSERVATORY / 4 YEARS OF STUDY

THE SECOND CYCLE CONSISTS OF 2 LEVELS, BROKEN DOWN AS FOLLOWS:

- > Cycle 2, 1st level (Elementary 1 & Elementary 2) // 2 years
- > Cycle 2, 2nd level (Intermediate 1 & Intermediate 2) // 2 years

EXAMS FOR CLASSICAL MUSIC TRAINING TAKE PLACE IN TWO STAGES:

- → Written exam: listening commentary, aural analysis, melodic and rhythmic transcription at elementary and intermediate levels
- → Oral exam: sight-reading (treble and bass clefs), rhythm reading, binary and ternary rhythm reading, vocal sight-reading, instrumental sight-reading at elementary and intermediate levels

EXAMS FOR VOCAL MUSIC TRAINING TAKE PLACE IN TWO STAGES:

- → Sight-reading tests: sung sight-reading with note names, sung sight-reading with lyrics, rhythmic prosody, popular song sight-read a cappella, keyboard harmonization of a song
- → Prepared tests: a duo practiced during the year, a song accompanied by themselves, prepared independently one month in advance.
- > Advancement to the next level is granted with a score of 12/20 in the presence of an internal jury composed of teachers from the department.
- > The end-of-cycle 2 exam and the awarding of the B.E.M. require a score of 12/20 in the presence of external juries at the conservatory.

> CYCLE 3 • ADVANCED STUDY AND DEVELOPMENT OF AUTONOMY

DISCIPLINE FOLLOWED AT THE IIMM / FINAL EXAM EACH YEAR UP TO THE C.E.M. - D.E.M. / 1 TO 2 YEARS OF STUDY

- → Oral exam: Vocal and instrumental practice (individual and/or group)
- → Written exam: After approval of the topic by the teacher, writing a 10-page paper on musical culture, history & analysis
- → Written exam: Theory (questions on the topics studied during the year)
- > Advancement to the next level and obtaining a C.E.M. require a score of 12/20 in the presence of both internal and external juries at the IIMM; a score of 14/20 is required for a D.E.M., also evaluated by internal and external juries at the IIMM

- →Sight-reading tests: sung sight-reading with note names, sung sight-reading with lyrics, rhythmic prosody, keyboard harmonization of a duo
- → Prepared tests: three trios, one of which is randomly selected by the jury; duo prepared in pairs independently, with each student accompanying the other.
- > Advancement to the next level is granted with a score of 14/20 in the presence of an internal jury composed of teachers from the department.
- > The awarding of the C.F.E.M. (Certificate of Completion of Musical Studies) requires a score of 14/20 in the presence of external juries at the conservatory.
